




## **Action Spectrum**

Designing for a spectrum of action






### Action Spectrum – What does it tell us?



Level of risk, leadership required, resourcing and vulnerability

### **Nuclear Weapons across the spectrum...**









Individual, variable actions in response to a specific/ immediate need. Actions that interact /connect, and enable new patterns and solutions to emerge. Coordinated and orderly actions contributing to a shared goal. Action is reliable, repeatable (at scale) and controlled by an external agency.



#### **Activators**


 Sparking action in others, leading events and initiatives, curating or creating content and stories
